

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
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What can we design?

The Process

While every design process is flexible, the heart of human centered design can be found in the following five components.



The Value of a Human Centered Design Approach

Although human centered design shares traits with other social and behavior change approaches, it offers unique value by privileging the following tenants throughout the process.



Empathy & Participation

Understanding and changing behavior is impossible without deeply understanding the people themselves. Human centered design goes deeper to surface influences, motivations, hopes, fears, and the other many aspects which comprise the messy experience of being human. Not only that, but human centered design also actively privileges beneficiaries by involving and learning from them every step of the way.



Iterative experimentation

While operating in complex systems, human centered designers understand that they won't get it right the first time, or even the 50th time. Therefore, they experiment rapidly and iterate several times before scaling, considering the usefulness and usability reported by beneficiaries. Rather than experiencing frustration, designers use failures and setbacks as an opportunity to be curious and learn more from beneficiaries for a truly meaningful final solution.



Collaboration & Creativity

Lastly and most importantly, human centered designers recognize that good design is never created in a vacuum and that optimal creativity is only possible through a careful combination of perspectives. Therefore, designers work alongside donors, researchers, technical experts, community members, and more to weave together solutions that will stick. Leveraging HCD to Address IPV Challenges

We found that...

Across Australia, more than half of women who have experienced violence at the hands of their former partner did so while they were pregnant, according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics.



And so, we...

Co-creatively designed the Family Safety Services Hub to

catalyze systemic change in the community in ways that improve the ability to prevent, intervene in, and respond to domestic and family violence.



And we invited...

Support groups, government services and not-for profit groups who deal with family violence.

There was also representation from indigenous groups and even men with lived experience of navigating the family violence system. "How bringing the power of design led innovation could save lives"

While building the Family Safety Services Hub, our research told us...

That those who experience family violence are most likely to confide in "trusted persons", however, those trusted people were frequently unsure of what to look for in circumstances of possible family violence or how best to proceed when somebody shared details of such violence with them.

Which led to...

Involving such people in the Hub's innovation process to create prototypes for action: pilot projects that can be rapidly trialed and then expanded if they prove successful.

All Family Safety Services Hub projects aim to...

Understand the

dynamics of family violence so as to create a system that encourages women to come forward. **Identify** those at most risk of family violence so that early intervention can take place. **Equip** those who are in position as "trusted people" to identify and respond to family violence, across a range of different cultural settings and circumstances.



HCD Thought Exercise

Iterative Experimentation

While building empathy, you discover that some trusted persons fear if they intervene, they may exacerbate the abuse experienced by the IPV survivor.

How might we equip trusted persons to identify and respond to IPV?

How might you experiment with new solutions that serve the same goal?

How might you iterate based on feedback you receive?
