INTRODUCTION

- Rates of facility-based delivery have increased significantly in Liberia recently, however, 20% of women still deliver at home
- Women who live in rural areas or belong to lower socio-economic strata are those who face the greatest difficulties
- The USAID-funded Breakthrough ACTION project sought to develop innovative solutions powered by behavioral science to address behavioral barriers to facilitybased delivery (FBD) in Liberia



METHODS

- 58 in-depth interviews with postpartum women, their male partners and families, and community and facility-based health workers as part of formative research to diagnose barriers
- 3 rounds of iterative user testing and co-design of solutions in communities and health facilities

RESULTS

- Many women had a preferred mechanism for storing savings but no way to track progress or understand if they had saved enough for delivery. Safety concerns were top-of-mind, so we developed a discrete savings tracker
- Traditional midwives were powerful advocates for pregnant women. We leveraged Liberian storytelling traditions to facilitate comprehension and application of tools designed with and for traditional midwives
- Working closely with women, community leaders, and providers allowed us to develop multiple iterations of the solutions and carefully design features that were clear, easy to employ, and attractive to use

DISCUSSION

- Insights from behavioral science can inform design of interventions to overcome structural challenges
- Diagnosing behavioral barriers and their underlying drivers in the context was critical to ensure that co-design efforts targeted the right challenges
